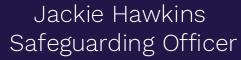

Regular **school attendance** is a very **important** part of giving children the best possible start in life. The aim should be to attend **100%** of the time.


How to help...


Make doctors and dentists appointments during the school holidays, on a Friday afternoon or after school.

Absence and Recent Government Changes

A new national framework for penalty notices for school absences came into effect from Monday 19 August 2024.

- A penalty notice must be considered if a child has 10 unauthorised sessions for any reason (equivalent to 5 school days) within a 10 school week period.
- There will be an increase in the penalty fine from £60 to £80 if paid in 21 days. If the fine is not paid by the first 21 days, it will rise to £160 if paid within 28 days of being issued.

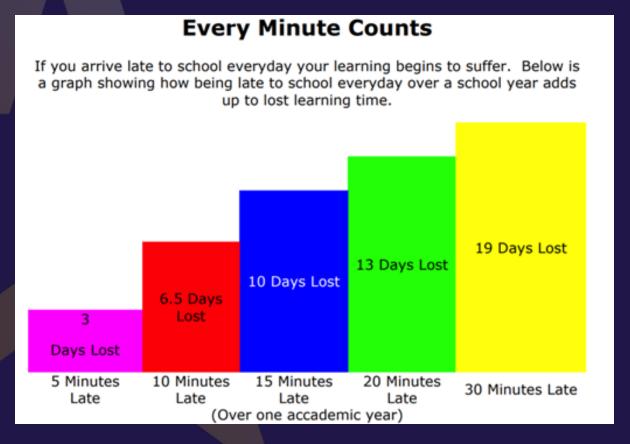


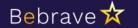






Morning routines for a Year Reception child

School routines

- Gates open at 8:20am
- If children are arriving at school before this time, they must attend breakfast club
- Breakfast club starts at 8:00 please book in

Children will bring home a reading book that is suited to their attainment level. Our school expectation across the school is for them to read this book every night. This is recoded using the Boom Reader app.



Boom Reader - This app allows children, staff and adults at home to all easily record children's reading in one place. Children can have multiple books logged at once. When the book has been read, children will quiz using Accelerated Reader and are aiming to achieve 80% +.










Reading for pleasure





Children are given an individual reading target each half term which they work towards by recording their daily reading and quizzing on books when completed. When children achieve their target, they get the opportunity to wear the 'golden jumper' so that their progress can be celebrated by the whole school.

Each Friday, we have a Shine Brightly certificate for children who have really stood out that week. The following week, all those children's names go into a golden hat and 3 are selected at random to choose a book from the vending machine. This is for the child to keep forever and enjoy at home.












How can you help your child in Year Reception?

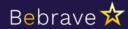

Our Curriculum

Talk for Writing

Talk for Writing is a teaching framework that enables children to imitate the language they need for a particular topic orally, before reading and analysing it and then writing their own versions. The texts we will be focusing on are The Three Little Pigs, We're Going on a Bear Hunt, The Three Billy Goats Gruff, The Gruffalo, Jack and the Beanstalk and Handa's Surprise.





Maths

We follow a 'teaching for mastery' curriculum supported by White Rose Maths resources. Mastering maths supports all children by starting with a practical approach and leading to applying their knowledge through reasoning and problem solving.

Science

Our Science curriculum is designed to develop curiosity and interest in the world around us and help children to learn about how science benefits our everyday lives.

Religious Education

Throughout the year in RE, the children will learn about the following religions: Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Isalm and Sikhism through a range of topics including special stories and special places.

Physical Education

Throughout the year in PE, the children will cover the following units: Fundamentals in PE, Dance, Ball skills and games.

PSHE

Throughout the year in PSHE, the children will cover the following units: Being me in the world, Celebrating difference, Dreams and Goals, Healthy Me, Relationships and Changing Me.

Other Subjects

The children will also have lessons in History. Geography, Art, Design Technology, Music, Computing and French.

EYFS EARLY ADOPTER EARLY LEARNING GOALS

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Building relationships Work and play cooperatively and take turns with others. Form positive attachments to adults and friendships with peers, show sensitivity to their own and to others' needs.
- Managing Self the confident to try new activities and show independence, resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge. Explain the reasons for rules, know right from wrong and try to behave accordingly. Manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs including dressing, going to the totlet and understanding the importance of healthy food choices.
- Self-regulation Show an understanding of their own feelings and those of others, and begin to regulate their behaviour. Set and work towards simple goals, being able to wait for what they want and control their immediate irreputies when appropriate, over focused attention to what the teacher says, responding appropriately even when engaged in activity, and show an ability to follow instructions involving several tideos or actions:

Communication and Language

Listening and Attention and Understanding — Listen attentively and respond to what they hear with relevant questions, comments and actions when being read to and during whole class discussions and small group interactions. Male comments about what they have beard and ask questions to clarify their understanding, read conversation when engaged in back and- forth exchanges with their teacher and peers

Speaking - Participate in small group, class and one-to-one discussions, offering their own ideas, using recently introduced vocabulary. Offer explanations for very thrigs might happen, making use of recently introduced vocabulary from stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems when appropriate. Express their ideas and feedings about their experiences using full sentences, including use of past, present and future tenses and making use of conjunctions, with modelling and support from their teacher.

Physical Development

Gross Motor Skills - Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others. Demonstrate strength, balance and coordination when playing, Move energetically, such as running, jumping, diancing, hopping, slopping and climbing Fine Motor Skills - Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing — using the tripod grip in almost all cases, use a range of small tools, including scissors, paintbrushes and cuttery, legion to show accuracy and care when drawing.

Literacy

- Comprehension Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary. Anticipate (where appropriate) key events in stories, the end understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems and during role play.
- Word Reading Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs. Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending, Read aloud simple sestences and books that are consistent with their phonic knowledge, including some
- Writing Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed. Spell words by Identifying sounds in them and representing the sounds with a letter or letters. Write simple phrases and sentences that can be read by others.

Maths

- Number Have a deep understanding of number to 10, including the composition of each number. Subtitise (recognise quantities withhout counting up to 15. Automatically recall (without reference to rhymes, counting or other adds) number bonds up to 5 (ecluding subtraction facts) and some number bonds to 10, including double facts.
- Numerical Patterns Verbally count beyond 20, recognising the pattern of the counting system. Compare quantities up to 10 in different contexts, recognising when one quantity is greater than, less than or the same as the other quantity. Explore and represent patterns within numbers up to 10, including evens and odds, double facts.


