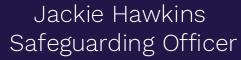

Regular **school attendance** is a very **important** part of giving children the best possible start in life. The aim should be to attend **100%** of the time.

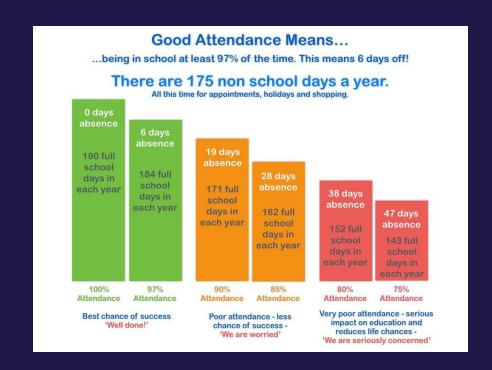
How to help...

Make doctors and dentists appointments during the school holidays, on a Friday afternoon or after school.

Absence and Recent Government Changes

A new national framework for penalty notices for school absences came into effect from Monday 19 August 2024.

- A penalty notice must be considered if a child has 10 unauthorised sessions for any reason (equivalent to 5 school days) within a 10 school week period.
- There will be an increase in the penalty fine from £60 to £80 if paid in 21 days. If the fine is not paid by the first 21 days, it will rise to £160 if paid within 28 days of being issued.

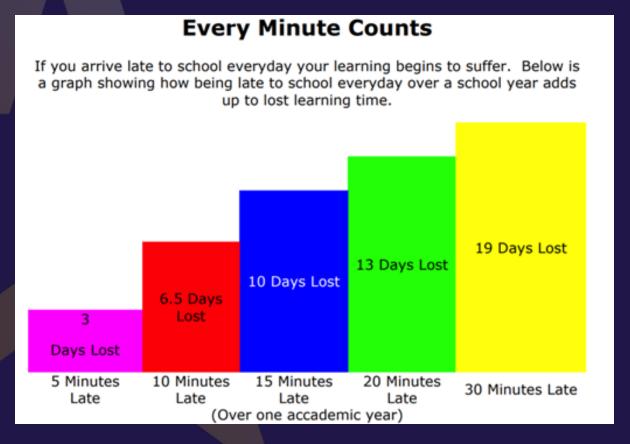


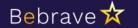

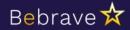




Morning routines for a Year 4 child

- You will receive a call from our admin team if your child is missing anything





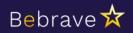




End of day routines for a Year 4 child

Children will bring home a reading book that is suited to their attainment level. Our school expectation across the school is for them to read this book every night. This is recorded using the Boom Reader app.



Boom Reader - This app allows children, staff and adults at home to all easily record children's reading in one place. Children can have multiple books logged at once. When the book has been read, children will quiz using Accelerated Reader and are aiming to achieve 80% +.

Children are given an individual reading target each half term which they work towards by recording their daily reading and quizzing on books when completed. When children achieve their target, they get the opportunity to wear the 'golden jumper' so that their progress can be celebrated by the whole school.

The following week, all those children's names go into a golden hat and 3 are selected at random to choose a book from the vending machine. This is for the child to keep forever and enjoy at home.

Year 4 Statutory Assessment Tasks Multiplication Tables Check

Starting on Monday 1st June 2026, the children will have a two-week period to undertake their Multiplication and Tables Check. This is designed to assess a pupil's ability to recall their times tables up to 12, which is important for future math success.

The check consists of:

- 25 questions on table up to 12 X 12 (mostly 6s, 7s, 8s, 9s and 12s)
- 6 seconds to answer each question

It is essential that children are not absent from school during this time.

Times table learning will be taking place every day in school.

How can you help your child in Year 4?

- Bring your child to school for 8.25am great attendance and punctuality
- Listen to your child read and support them to record their reading on Boom Reader
- Support with basic maths skills number formation, multiplication/ division facts for all times tables
- Support with basic English skills spellings/ letter formation/ handwriting

Our Year 4 PE day is a Thursday.













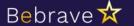

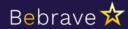

Our Curriculum

Talk for Writing and Talk for Reading

Talk for Writing is a teaching framework that enables children to imitate the language they need for a particular unit orally, before reading and analysing it and then writing their own versions.

Talk for Reading compliments our Talk for Writing approach, enriching and interweaving throughout our writing curriculum. Talk for Reading focuses on developing comprehension structured in a way that supports chil-



dren to read critically, appreciatively and confidently. This approach, like Talk for Writing uses the gradual release of responsibility model, supporting children in becoming independent readers.

Maths

Throughout the year in maths, the children will cover the following areas: Place value, Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division, Fractions, Decimals and Percentages, Converting units of measure, Area and Perimeter, Ratio, Statistics, Shape and Position and Direction.

Science

Throughout the year in science, the children will learn about Electricity, Sound, Animals including Humans, Living Things and their Habitats and States of Matter.

Religious Education

Throughout the year in RE, the children will learn about the following religions: Judaism and Christianity.

Physical Education

Throughout the year in PE, the children will cover the following units: Gymnastics, Ball Skills, Basketball, Dance, Swimming, Athletics, Yoga, OAA and Cricket.

PSHE

Throughout the year in PSHE, the children will cover the following units: Being me in my world, Celebrating difference, Dreams and goals, Healthy me, Relationships and Changing me.

Computing

Throughout the year in computing, the children will cover the following units: Coding, Online Safety and Spreadsheets.

History

Throughout the year in history, the children will learn about Amazon Rainforest and Migration.

Geography

Throughout the year in geography, the children will learn about Ancient Greeks, Anglo Saxons

Art and Design Technology

Throughout the year in art and DT, the children will cover the following units: Distortion, Lino Printing, Watercolours, Electrical Systems, Textiles and Levers and Pulleys.

Music

Throughout the year in music, the children will learn listening and appraising, singing, composing and musicianship/performing.

French

Throughout the year in French, the children will be learning about classroom objects, commands and jungle animals.

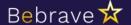
