Regular **school attendance** is a very **important** part of giving children the best possible start in life. The aim should be to attend **100%** of the time.

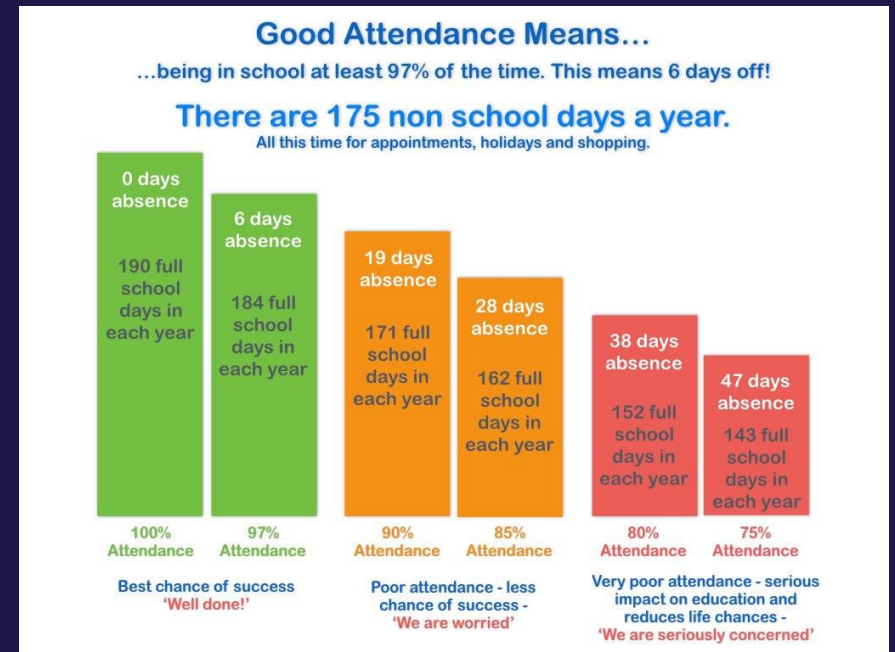
How to help...

There may be times where your child is too ill to attend school. Please call us on (01208) 72773 to report your child's absence.



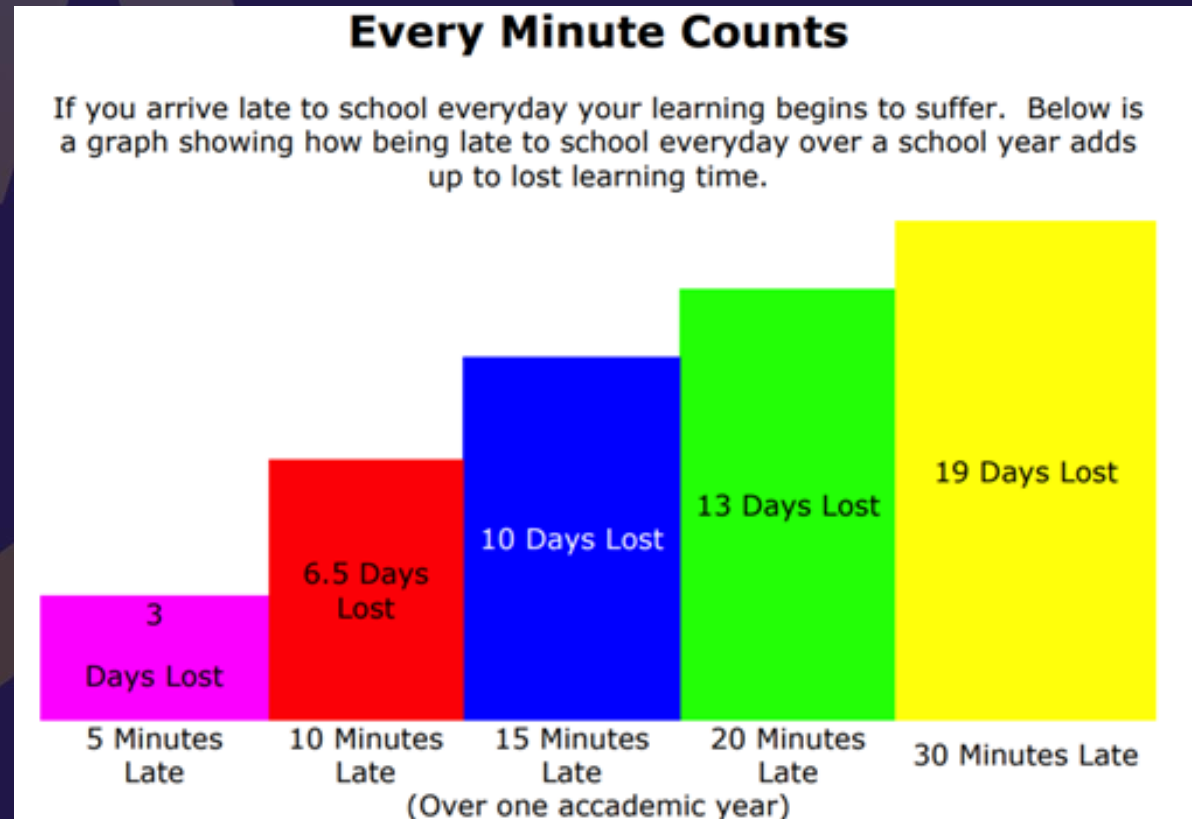
Absence and Recent Government Changes

A new national framework for penalty notices for school absences came into effect from Monday 19 August 2024.

- A penalty notice must be considered if a child has 10 **unauthorised** sessions for any reason (equivalent to 5 school days) within a 10 school week period.
- There will be an increase in the penalty fine from £60 to £80 if paid in 21 days. If the fine is not paid by the first 21 days, it will rise to £160 if paid within 28 days of being issued.

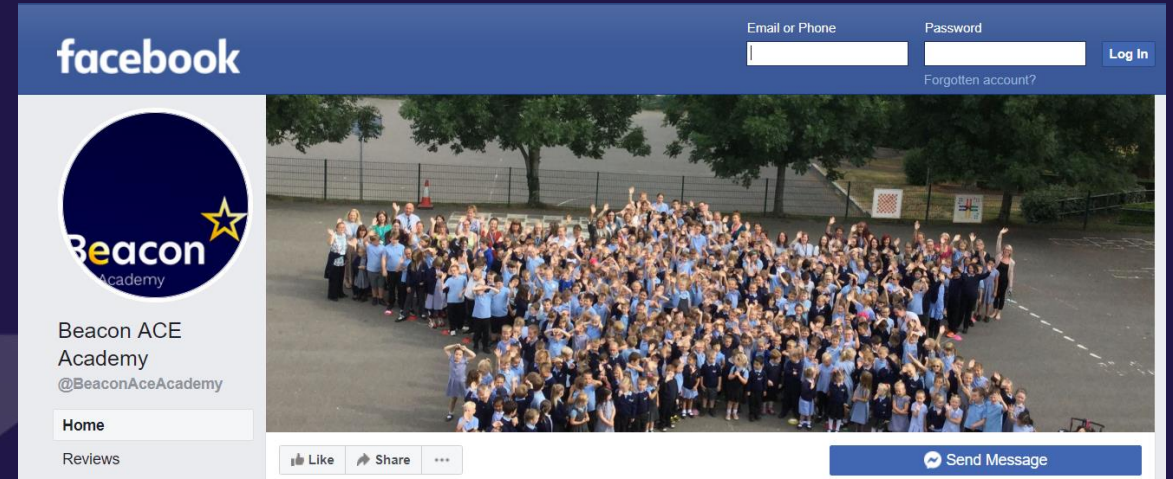
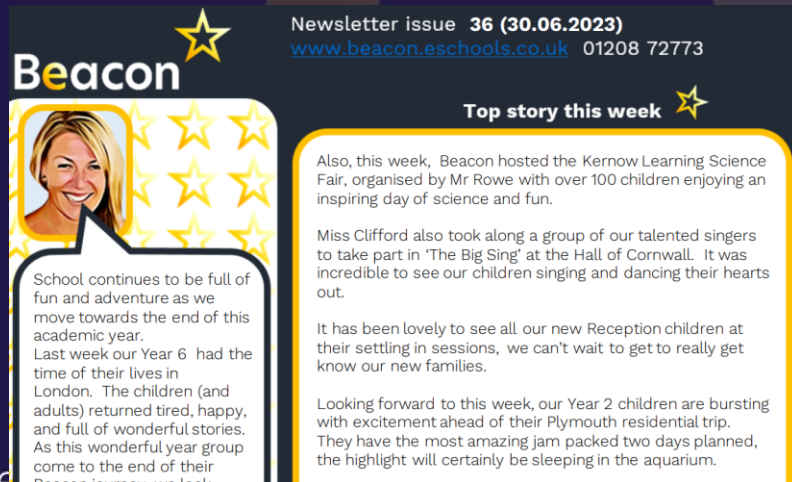

Morning routines for a Year 6 child

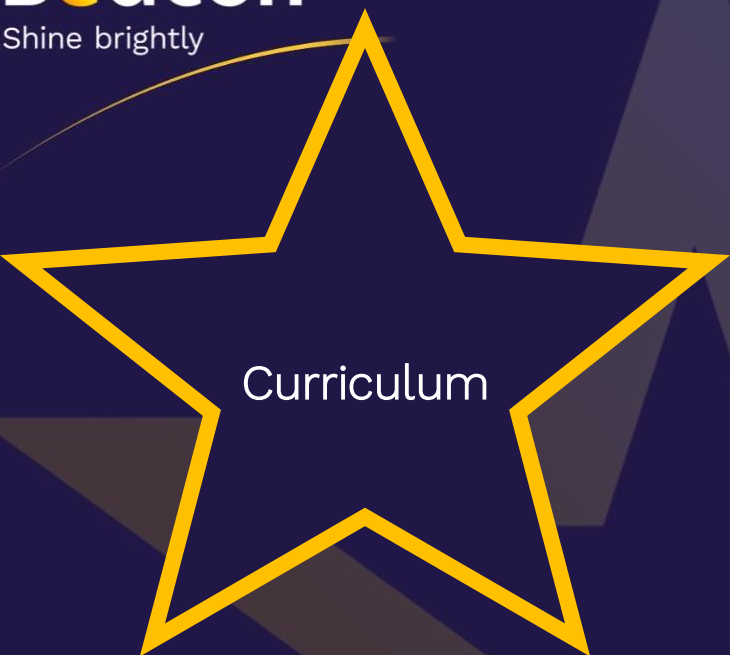
- Gates open at 8:20am
- If children are arriving at school before this time, they must attend breakfast club
- Breakfast club starts at 8:00 – please book in
- Your child's year group/class door will open at 8:25
- A member of our year 6 team (Mrs Hine) will warmly greet your child as they enter the school. This is an opportunity to ask questions or pass on any messages.
- As our children enter the school, we will be ensuring that they have everything they need – correct uniform, shoes, reading books, glasses etc
- You will receive a call from our admin team if your child is missing anything

Boom Reader - This app allows children, staff and adults at home to all easily record children's reading in one place. Children can have multiple books logged at once. When the book has been read, children will quiz using Accelerated Reader and are aiming to achieve 80% +.

The Talk for Writing approach enables children to read and write independently for a variety of audiences and purposes within different subjects.

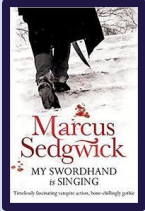
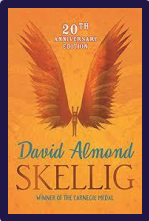
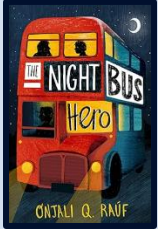
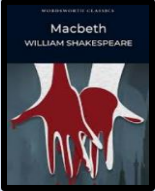

- ★ Homework: In the run up to SATs, the children will be provided with revision books which they will have to complete each week as homework. There will be more information on this closer to the time.
- ★ Full uniform including correct footwear

Year 6 Statutory Assessment Tasks SATS

In May 2026, the 11th to the 14th, the children will undertake their SATs.

- Maths – 3 papers
- Reading – 3 texts
- GPS – grammar paper/ spelling test

It is essential that children are not absent from school during this month.

Booster sessions will take place after Christmas.

Our Curriculum

Talk for Writing and Talk for Reading

Talk for Writing is a teaching framework that enables children to imitate the language they need for a particular unit orally, before reading and analysing it and then writing their own versions.

Talk for Reading compliments our Talk for Writing approach, enriching and interweaving throughout our writing curriculum. Talk for Reading focuses on developing comprehension structured in a way that supports children

to read critically, appreciatively and confidently. This approach, like Talk for Writing uses the gradual release of responsibility model, supporting children in becoming independent readers.



Maths

Throughout the year in maths, the children will cover the following areas: Place value, Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division, Fractions, Decimals and Percentages, Converting units of measure, Area and Perimeter, Ratio, Statistics, Shape and Position and Direction.

Science

Throughout the year in science, the children will learn about Electricity, Circulatory system, Light, Living things and their habitats and Evolution and inheritance.

Religious Education

Throughout the year in RE, the children will learn about the following religions: Islam and Christianity.

Physical Education

Throughout the year in PE, the children will cover the following units: gymnastics, fitness, yoga, basketball, dance, athletics, cricket and tag rugby.

PSHE

Throughout the year in PSHE, the children will cover the following units: Being me in my world, Celebrating difference, Dreams and goals, Healthy me, Relationships and Changing me.

Computing

Throughout the year in computing, the children will cover the following units: Coding, Online Safety and Spreadsheets.

History and Geography

Throughout the year in history and geography, the children will learn about The Industrial Revolution, The Blitz, The Civil Rights Movement, sustainable energy, manufacturing and industry and participate in a geological project on the local area.

Art and Design Technology

Throughout the year in art and DT, the children will cover the following units: Portraits, Printing, Sculpture, Wind Turbines, Anderson Shelters and Renewables.

Music

Throughout the year in music, the children will learn listening and appraising, singing, composing and musicianship/performing.

French

Throughout the year in French, the children will be learning Phonics, Animals, Myself, My Family and more.

END OF YEAR 6 EXPECTATIONS

Reading

- Refers to text to support opinions and predictions.
- Gives a view about choice of vocabulary, structure etc.
- Distinguish between fact & opinion.
- Appreciates how a set of sentences has been arranged to create maximum effect.
- Recognise complex sentences
- Skims and scans to aide note-taking.

Writing

- Use subordinate clauses to write complex sentences.
- Use passive voice where appropriate.
- Use expanded noun phrases to convey complicated information concisely (e.g. The fact that it was raining meant the end of sports day).
- Evidence of sentence structure and layout matched to requirements of text type.
- Use:
 - Semi-colon, colon, dash to mark the boundary between independent clauses.
 - Correct punctuation of bullet points.
 - Hyphens to avoid ambiguity.
 - Full range of punctuation matched to requirements of text type.
- Use wide range of devices to build cohesion within and across paragraphs.
- Use paragraphs to signal change in time, scene, action, mood or person.
- Legible, fluent and personal handwriting style.

Maths

- Compare & order numbers up to 10000000.
- Identify common factors, common multiples & prime numbers.
- Round any whole number to a required degree of accuracy.
- Multiply: 4-digit by 2-digit
- Divide: 4-digit by 2-digit
- Add & subtract fractions with different denominators & mixed numbers.
- Multiply simple pairs of proper fractions, writing the answer in the simplest form.
- Divide proper fractions by whole numbers.
- Calculate % of whole number.
