

Regular **school attendance** is a very **important** part of giving children the best possible start in life. The aim should be to attend **100%** of the time.


How to help...

Absence and Recent Government Changes


A new national framework for penalty notices for school absences came into effect from Monday 19 August 2024.

- A penalty notice must be considered if a child has 10 unauthorised sessions for any reason (equivalent to 5 school days) within a 10 school week period.
- There will be an increase in the penalty fine from £60 to £80 if paid in 21 days. If the fine is not paid by the first 21 days, it will rise to £160 if paid within 28 days of being issued.

Morning routines for a Year 2 child

Gates open at 8:15am.

If children are arriving at school before this, they must attend breakfast club. Breakfast Club starts at 8:00am – please book in ©

8.30am – A member of staff will open the main door on the middle playground and be there to answer any queries or take any messages as children enter their classrooms. Children come into class and complete morning maths.

Home time


Children will be released at 3.15pm.

Children will bring home a reading book that is suited to their attainment level. Our school expectation across the school is for them to read this book every night. This is recoded using the Boom Reader app.





Boom Reader - This app allows children, staff and adults at home to all easily record children's reading in one place. Children can have multiple books logged at once if they're reading both a home and a school book. When the book is completed, children will quiz using Accelerated Reader and are aiming to achieve 80% +.








Reading for pleasure

Children are given an individual reading target each half term which they work towards by recording their daily reading and quizzing on books when completed. When children achieve their target, they get the opportunity to wear the 'golden jumper' so that their progress can be celebrated by the whole school.

Each Friday, we have a Shine Brightly certificate for children who have really stood out that week. The following week, all those children's names go into a golden hat and 3 are selected at random to choose a book from the vending machine. This is for the child to keep forever and enjoy at home.

We deliver training to many schools throughout the year, sharing our expertise and practice.









Our Curriculum

Talk for Reading and Writing

Talk for Writing is a teaching framework that enables children to imitate the language they need for a particular topic orally, before reading and analysing it and then writing their own versions.

Talk for Reading allows children to fully immerse themselves in high-quality texts, giving them to have a deeper understanding of what they are reading.

Read, Write, Inc allows children to develop their knowledge of phonics and apply these to become confident early readers.



Maths

Throughout the year in maths, the children will cover the following areas: place value, addition and subtraction, shape, money, multiplication and division, measurement, fractions, time, statistics and position and direction.

Throughout the year in science, the children will cover the following units: animals including humans, uses of everyday materials, plants and habitats.

Religious Education

Throughout the year in RE, the children will learn about the following religions: Christianity, Judaism and Islam,

Physical Education

Throughout the year in PE, the children will cover the following units: fundamentals, dance, gymnastics, invasion games. fitness and athletics.

Throughout the year in PSHE, the children will cover the following units: Being me in the world, Celebrating Difference, Dreams and Goals, Healthy Me, Relationships and Changing Me.

Computing

Throughout the year in computing, the children will cover the following units: coding, online safety, questioning, creating pictures and making music.

History and Geography

Throughout the year in history and geography, the will cover the following units: lives of significant people, local places, significant events and continents.

Art and Design and Technology

Throughout the year in art and DT, the children will cover the following units: observational drawing, textiles, printing. structures, sculpture and mechanisms.

Music

Throughout the year in music, the children will cover the following units: singing, composition and musicianship.

French

Throughout the year in French, the children will cover the following units: minibeasts, pirate personalities, over the rainbow, dinosaurs, birthday party, me and my puppy.

END OF YEAR 2 EXPECTATIONS

Reading

- Read ahead to help with fluency & expression.
- Comments on plot, setting & characters in familiar & unfamiliar stories.
- Recounts main themes & events.
- Comments on structure of the text.
- Use commas, question marks & exclamation marks to vary
- Read aloud with expression & intonation.
- Recognise:
- speech marks
- contractions
- Identify past/present tense.
- Use content and index to locate information.

Writing

- Write different kinds of sentence: statement, question, exclamation, command.
- Use expanded noun phrases to add description & specification.
- Write using subordination (when, if, that, because).
- Correct & consistent use of present tense & past tense.
- Correct use of verb tenses.
- Correct & consistent use of: capital letters, full stops. question marks, exclamation marks, commas in a list, apostrophe (omission).
- Introduction of speech marks.
- Write under headings.
- Evidence of diagonal & horizontal strokes to join handwriting.

Maths

- Compare & order numbers up to 100.
- Read & write all numbers to 100 in digits & words.
- Say 10 more/less than any number to 100.
- Count in multiples of 2, 3 & 5 & 10 from any number up to 100.
- Recall & use multiplication & division facts for 2, 5 & 10 tables. Recall & use +/- facts to 20.
- Derive & use related facts to 100.
- Recognise PV of any 2-digit number.
- Add & subtract: 2-digit nos & ones / tens, two 2-digit nos and three 1-digit nos
- Recognise & use inverse (+/-).
- Calculate & write multiplication & division calculations using multiplication tables.
- Recognise & use inverse (x/+).
- Recognise, find, name & write 1/3; 1/4; 2/4; 3/4.
- Recognise equivalence of simple fractions.
- Tell time to five minutes, including quarter past/to.







We look forward to every child in Year 2 shining brightly next year.
